Good communication is vitally important to the success of most businesses. This is especially true in the rail industry as we use a multitude of different methods to communicate both internally and externally. Electronic Data Interchange (EDI) occurs around the clock every day of the year, to and from customers, railroads and data service companies. Automatic Electronic Interchange (AEI) equipment is used to interchange information to trace railcars allowing for the updating of Estimated Time of Arrival along with other needed information. Hand-held and base radios are utilized for communication between trains, Engineers and Conductors, Dispatch, Yardmasters, Maintenance of Way crews, and communication

with other railroads and their crews as well. Hand-held radios are vital to ensuring safe operations. On most of the southern portion of the LSRC line, Centralized Train Control (CTC) is utilized as another form of communication and technology. CTC gives the Dispatchers a realtime computer view of the rail line which allows them to direct train movements by utilizing signal changes and controlling positions of powered switches. The use of CTC helps move trains more efficiently and safely.



We live in the age of computers and frankly, I'm not sure any business can survive today without them. Where would we be without email? Accounting, receivables, purchasing, payables, training programs, inventory, transportation, cell phones, security cameras and so many more vital functions of the business landscape, rely heavily on the ever-evolving world of technology.


Like many conveniences in our lives, we just expect all of our electronic devices and systems to perform reliably without any thought for what it



LSRC—New Conductor Training



Safety first has been ingrained into the collective culture of all railroaders, which is a welcome change from years ago when brakemen would walk on top of moving cars to set handbrakes or make ties with link and pin couplers. Similarly, the Safety and Training Department at LSRC has advanced significantly over the last several years along with the strength of our field management. These advance-

ments were very timely as LSRC has added a significant number of new conductors and engineers due to growth and attrition. This resulted in 29 new T&E team members joining LSRC since January of 2022. The influx of new hire conductors has put significant pressure on our Safety and Training Department as they teach, coach, and mentor the new hires. In our industry, the highest risk employees are typically employees with less than a year of experience. The onboarding of new T&E employees occurred as our Safety and Training Department has implemented an overhauled conductor training program which is much more in depth, including more classroom time than ever before. The field employees have been key as well, since they are the daily trainer, while the new hires go through on the job training. This work seems to be paying off as LSRC was awarded an ASLRRA "Jake" Award for safety for the first time in many years. The Jake Award honors railroads with less than a 2.0 injury rate per 200,000 man hours worked. LSRC came in at less than 1.5. The goal is always zero injuries and we are making progress towards that goal. As of this writing, we have now surpassed a year injury free in the transportation department, which is significant when you consider that we have onboarded 29 new conductors/engineers since the beginning of last year.

I am also proud to say that our car department is approaching a year and a half without a lost time injury. The hard work of our Safety team, our field managers, and the employees who work on the ballast line is paying off in reaching our goal of zero lost time injuries.

SESSEFETY COUNT

Lake State Railway Company is proud to announce that we recently were honored by the American Short Line & Regional Railroad Association (ASLRRA) with a Jake Safety Award for 2022. The award, established in 1999, and named in honor of Lowell S. "Jake" Jacobson, who passionately promoted railroad safety amongst short-line and regional railroads, is presented to Regional and Short Line railroads who perform better than the industry average for injury frequency rate as reported by the Federal Railroad Administration.

The ASLRRA, which serves as a collective voice for Class II and III railroads, boasts a membership of more than 1,000 railroads, of which, Lake State Railway was amongst only 33 railroads nationwide to earn the coveted award with an undeniably impressive injury frequency rate that was an astounding 25% less than the industry average.

The injury frequency rate, which is calculated by tracking the number of FRA reportable injuries for every 200,000 hours worked, was a 2.01 for 2022, with Lake State Railway holding an injury frequency rate of only 1.49.

I am unbelievably proud of our team and the tremendous amount of focus and effort that has been put forth to ensure we are able to move Michigan safely, each and every day.

Their attentiveness, and unwavering commitment towards ensuring we operate in the highest echelon of safety is undoubtedly what has allowed us to earn this award for the first time since 2017. It should paint a very vivid picture that when it comes to safety, while there is always room for improvement, Lake State Railway is on the right track.

Amber Neumeyer in her own words:



2023 marks my 8th calendar year as a Dispatcher/ Yardmaster with Lake State Railway. Most of my days are spent dispatching from the control tower in the Saginaw Yard. Over 370 miles of main track line with 6 subdivisions is dispatcher-controlled and it can get a little hectic from time to time. We control all permission of movements of trains, men and equipment that operate on our rail lines.

I have to say that what I enjoy most about my job is when a plan-comes-together. The years of experi-

ence in this position have given me the ability to authorize rail occupancy really efficiently. I get a big kick out of it when I estimate correctly (like down to the minute) the availability of a track, when a train will be clear, or what time limits will be in use. It doesn't happen as often as it could, but I get pretty excited when it does. I do my absolute best to not keep anyone waiting and it seems like they really appreciate that. I'm a mother at heart—for me that means I take every chance I get to step back, slow down, and create a teachable moment for a new hire, or have a conversation and reflect with another seasoned employee.

Hands down, the most important part of my Job is safely authorizing track occupancy. What does that look like? - It means that anybody working on any LSRC tracks is made aware of any conflicting or upcoming movements, defects, or restrictions that could interfere with or affect their jobs in that area. One wrong authorization could be detrimental so it's imperative to be on my game at all times.

Before coming on-board with Lake state, I was "a Jack-ofall trades, but master of none". It all began in high school with the local career center where I developed some pretty handy skills. My senior year, me and 3 team members competed in the State building trades competition called "Team Build". The project was to construct a small building using the 4 trades, a Mason, a Plumber, an Electrician and a Carpenter. I was the Carpenter. We were judged on different criteria such as reading blueprints, teamwork, job 💙 💙 💙 safety, cleanliness, presentation skills and of course the

actual structure. We must've done a heck of a job because we won 1st place in the whole State of Michigan. Back then, I was awarded for both my carpentry skills and for breaking gender norms.


